Two parcels will be sent to each man. The first, despatched this week, contains the following : -

Tea, 1/21b. Milk, 1lb. Sugar, ½lb. Cocoa, 1/2lb. Tongue Oxo Packets soup Golden Syrup Vasaline Mustard Wool Thread Needles Cigarettes (boxes and packets) Slade's Toffee Carbolic Soap Chocolate "Bulls' eyes" The other parcels will each contain: -Cardigan jacket Two pairs socks Khaki handkerchiefs 2lb tin beef Biscuits (2lbs.) Stationery cabinet Salmon Xmas Pudding (2lbs.)

It is desired to send a pipe and say quarter pound of tobacco to each man if our readers will subscribe another sovereign.

The parcels were arranged and packed by Miss Wheeler, Pier Street, and Mrs. B.W. Russell. This involved a good deal of labour, and we have to acknowledge Miss Wheeler's initiative in the matter and the business-like and expert way in which she packed the parcels.

The total amount expended to date is $\pounds 22$ 18s. 4d., leaving $\pounds 1$ 2s. 8d., in hand. Anyone may see the vouchers and accounts by calling at this office

The address of Pte. J.H. Jolliffe, 48th Canadian Highlanders, is to hand, and two parcels have been sent to him. He is a prisoner in Germany. The name of another prisoner in Germany, Charles Pittis, A.B., late H.M.S. Nestor, has also been received. A parcel, or two parcels, will be sent to him in due course.

Each of the prisoners will also be sent before December 1st, the following: -100 cigarettes, best quality Tobacco (¼lb.) Briar pipe, value 1/-. Biscuits, 1lb. Cheese, ½lb. Bulls' eyes, &c., 1b.

The approximate value of the contents of ten of the parcels was 15/-, and the other ten, £1 2s. 6d. Parcels to the value of 10/- each are being prepared.

PRISONERS OF WAR FUND. – Eleven more parcels have been despatched this week – five to Germany, four to Turkey and two to Holland. Each contained 100 cigarettes, quarter-pound tobacco, pipe, 1lb. sweets and toffee, khaki handkerchief, 1lb. biscuits, ½lb. English cheese, ½lb. carbolic soap, &c. Remaining goods which could not be posted have been sent to the Bonchurch Convalescent Home. – There is an amount of 8/3 in hand.

(for several weeks prior to the parcels being sent to the prisoners of war the Mercury had listed the amounts of money and items that had been received with the names of the donors)
